This year we gave ■ out 18 bids and 16 accepted. The two who did not accept had very specific reasons that were fairly out of our control. One preferred pledging a dry fraternity, the other did not join because of his

parents wanted him to remain on campus and not move into the house. He stated that he could not justify the extra \$1,000 payment for being a member of the fraternity to his parents.

For the first time in a while, we went under budget with Rush. Isaac Perper gave us a budget of \$36,000 and we spent \$33,000. In Rush 2017, our expenses totalled to about \$38,500. This is a huge improvement with no poor consequences. This success in lowering the budget can possibly lead to lowering the budget even more in the future until we reach a converging point. The \$33,000 we spent also includes some of the VP costs that occurred during work week. We split the costs of renovating the first floor bathroom and fixing the yard.

The actual structure and schedule of Rush was very similar to past years. We kept up with our signature jaunts of paintball, jet ski/beach day, and battle canoes. Similar to previous years, battle canoes was our best and most favored event among the rushing freshmen. Instead of doing mini jaunts at a different location for people who couldn't make the main jaunts, we had events at the house with brothers. This proved just as effective and more economical.
